THE HISTORY AND BENEFITS OF ELDERBERRY

When it comes to medicinal plants, none are more popular than Elderberry. This is a plant with a long, rich history that began in the Native American and ancient Egyptian cultures. The Elder Plant History

The Elder plant became popular right around 2000 B.C.E. for its medicinal uses. People found that the leaves, bark, and berries cured a variety of ailments. While it's widely used today for treating the symptoms of the common cold, it has been used for centuries to treat things like toothaches, headaches, cuts, burns, and fevers. In the Native American culture, the Elder plant was used to treat infections

There was a time when the Elder plant was used as a fire-starting aid. The branches acted as straws because they were hollow, so people were able to blow through them -- creating wind for fires. In some cultures, however, this act was frowned upon. Cutting down or burning the wood was considered bad luck. It was said that spirits would reprimand those who damaged an Elder plant.

Because of its hollowed structure, it was also popular to use Elder plants to make instruments like flutes. Everyday items could be fashioned out of the elder because of its strength; you could often see things like gates/fences and combs/brushes made from the trunk. And finally, during the Victorian Era, the elderflower was used by women to create brighter complexions.

The rich history of the elder tree/plant extends beyond its medicinal uses. The Elder tree was arguably the most worshipped tree in existence. The Roman Empire eventually banned the worshipping of trees as deities in the 9th century, and then

again in 1227. But before that, the plant was said to have an effect on the way people prayed. People were told to kneel at the tree with heads bowed to ask for blessings from Mother Earth.

In medieval times, the trees were planted close to homes and were said to scare away devils and witches. The twigs were even used as talismans to carry -- people believed they would offer protection from evil spirits. Today, the tree is still celebrated and revered in some circles.

Modern-Day Benefits of Elderberry

Today, Elderberry is still used to treat influenza and cold symptoms because it's packed with vitamins and antioxidants. People use it mainly in teas, but it also comes in pill and tincture form. When patients are looking for holistic remedies, doctors will recommend Elderberry for things like joint pain, headaches, stress, constipation, and even struggling kidneys. That being said, with modernday science and medications, we know that this plant isn't a "cure-all." It has immune-boosting properties and it's good for the body, but it also has a few drawbacks.

For example, when it's ingested improperly, the plant can cause cramping, stomach pain, nausea, and somnolence. If taken in large doses, it can be harmful. The uncooked berries or flowers can cause diarrhea, as well. The leaves and twigs of the Elderberry plant are also said to be toxic because of the high levels of cyanide present. It's also unsafe for women who are pregnant or breastfeeding.

PREP YOUR YARD FOR SPRING

Here are some tips to help you keep your grass alive and to prevent extra work in the spring.

It is true; grass is less active in the winter and may even become dormant due to harsh weather conditions. If grass is left too long in winter it can become perfect homes to small rodents who burrow and build nests on it which will create dead spots.

Pick up leaves, branches, yard waste containers, lawn equipment, etc. off of the grass because if left for long periods of time it can kill the grass underneath causing more damage than the cold weather itself.

Shoveling walkways and keeping them clear of ice will prevent the urge to walk on your snow covered grass; this will reduce heavy foot traffic. Compacted dirt and soil on your lawn will damage and smother the grass.

If there is a need to keep where you shoveled clear of snow and ice, then sprinkle a "snow and ice melt" product in that area while still being careful not to get it on the grass. (Using sand will be less damaging if it does touch your lawn.)

CHEESY GARLIC BREAD

Ingredients:

- 1¼ Stick Unsalted Butter Softened
- 1 Tbsp Extra Virgin Olive Oil
- 3 Cloves Pressed Garlic into the butter
- 1tsp Garlic Powder
- 2 Tbsp Minced Parsley
- ¼ tsp Seasoning Salt
- 1 tsp Italian Seasoning (or any herb)
- 4 Tbsp Parmesan Cheese grated (2 each side)
- 1 cup Mozzarella Cheese grated
- ½ cup Colby Cheese
- Baquette

Instructions:

- 1. Mix Butter, Oil, Salt, Parmesan Cheese, Garlic Powder and Garlic.
- 2. Preheat oven to 400 degrees.
- 3. Cut baguette horizontal with serrated knife.
- 4. Place bread on sheet pan with parchment smear both sides of bread evenly with the mix butter mix ingredients.
- Sprinkle Mozzarella, Colby, and Parsley or bread.
- 6. Bake 8-12 minutes and enjoy!
